Jacob Albright answered this call.


Albright, a soldier in the War for Independence, experienced conversion under the preaching and teaching of godly leaders. Settling in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, he began his preaching as a circuit rider, organizing groups of prayer and worship. Many like-minded people gathered about him, and out of this humble beginning came the organization of the Evangelical Association.

This denomination grew rapidly on the early American frontier and was noted for its aggressive and vibrant faith. With the establishment of many new churches came institutions of higher learning, publication of books used in worship and Christian education, and support of the Sunday school movement, missionary societies and Christian Endeavor.

The late nineteenth century saw the church reorganized into the United Evangelical Church. Within 25 years the denomination almost doubled in size.

Following World War I the leaders of the Church declined to have part in a planned merger. They determined to push forward as the Evangelical Congregational Church.

Today the earnest and sincere zeal of Jacob Albright lives on in the vision and spirit of our many churches. Today, we are continuing the work Albright began, a ministry of people to people, as defined by the Bible.



- That our world is under the sway of sin as a result of historical and a personal human rebellion against God, so that suffering, death and separation from God are the experience of humankind; and that without the intervention of God's grace, this will be the eternal state of all persons.
- That Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God, through his virgin birth, sinless life, sacrificial death on the Cross, and glorious resurrection and ascension, graciously offers new life to all who receive him by faith.
- That the Holy Spirit, indwelling believers, gives them a desire and an ability to follow biblical standards of conduct in their personal lives and in society.
- That the Christian faith is lived in the community of the church, where worship and witness are embodied through the spiritual gifts of its members.
- That Jesus Christ will return to this world, bring an end to history as we know it, inaugurate the final

judgment, and welcome believers into his eternal kingdom.

HOW WE WORK

In our local congregations the pastor is charged with supervising the work. Each congregation has its own governing body, an Official Board or Ministry Council, which gives direction to the entire church program. The board or council assigns much of its work to other local commissions and committees in matters of property, finance, education, evangelism, youth work and missions.

Our name, "Evangelical" expresses our desire to share our faith with others; and "Congregational" describes our form of government. Each congregation owns its property, determines its membership, manages its affairs and has the final prerogative in choosing its ecclesiastical affiliation.

Though we are congregational, we are not independent of one another. We enjoy a fellowship of congregations called the National Conference that supports the local congregations through a Bishop and several Conference Ministers.
