From the Bishop:

October is Pastor Appreciation Month. As bishop, I am in the rather unique position of interacting with lots of pastors. In fact, I have the opportunity to talk with those who are considering entering the pastorate as they participate in our Pastoral Assessment Center every January. Then too, I talk with those who are at the other end of the line, those who have served the Lord and his church for years, when I attend our annual Retired Pastors' Banquet held this month at StoneRidge's Poplar Run Campus. Then too Gloria and I are on the road most Sunday mornings traveling to a church to talk with lots of people, spend a little time with the pastor and his wife, and yes, preach a sermon.

What I have learned about the pastors of the Evangelical Congregational Church is that while they may look and sound very different from each other, there are a lot of things they have in common. Over the years we have developed a list of essential qualities for a pastor in

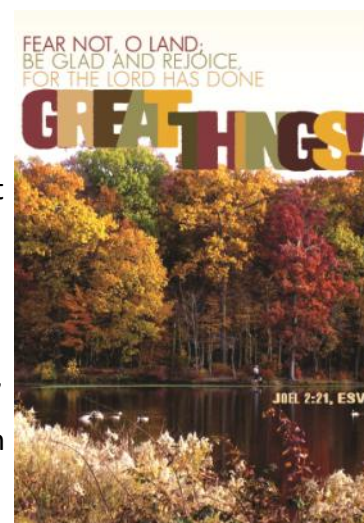

News from the Executive Director

ACTIVE PASTOR'S HEALTH INSURANCE

The current plan with Capital Blue Cross (CBC) was retained for the new plan year effective October 1, 2018 with the elimination of the dental plan. There are no changes to benefit levels and no premium increase. The HRA with PrimePay is still active and with the same benefit levels. The annual maximum out of pocket for covered medical expenses, excluding co-pays, remains at \$500 with the HRA paying costs above \$500. The maximum out of pocket for prescriptions and outpatient therapy services also remains at \$1,800 annually. New cards for the new plan year will be issued but the plan numbers will not change. Continue to use your current card until a new card is received.

Thanks to all that completed the Highmark Blue Shield applications. While the final quote by Highmark Blue Shield was not competitive we feel that CBC knowing we were going through the application process with Highmark helped with our current year renewal. The US health insurance market is constantly in flux. The circumstances surrounding the annual plan renewal are different every year. However, the trend to push responsibility for health care and lifestyle decision onto the individual is continuing with your pocketbook feeling the most pain. Planning for your long term health is just as important as planning for your retirement. Accidents and illnesses are going to happen but many healthcare conditions are preventable and manageable with healthy lifestyle choices.

If you are an EC Pastor below Medicare Eligibility age and not on the EC group health insurance plan you must complete a Health Insurance Election Not to Enroll form that is available on the website, <http://www.eccenter.com/Left/Member-Login/Benefits-Information/Health-Insurance.aspx>. The form must be completed each year by December 15. Please return the completed form to Dave King. The form may be mailed, faxed 717-866-7583 or returned electronically, dking@eccenter.com. If you are not returning the form electronically please do not include your social security number.

HIGHMARK SENIOR BLUE RENEWAL

The rates for the Highmark Freedom Blue plan are increasing by \$10/mon to \$234/mon per person with no change in benefits. The change will be effective on January 1, 2019 to be paid by December 15, 2018. Please remember retirees will be picking up an additional 20% of the premium cost with the last premium subsidy in December 2019. Highmark Senior Blue will continue with the direct billing to the retirees.

It is very important that the retiree does not fall behind on payments to Highmark Freedom Blue. If a retiree is having difficulty paying the monthly premium the Manna Fund is available for financial assistance. Please contact David King in the EC Benefits office for a Manna Fund application.

The **2019 Pastoral Compensation Forms** will be available on the Church Center website no later than October 1, 2018. Expect the Social Security Administration to release the 2019 COLA in late October 2018. Early estimates from various internet bloggers is for a 3.0% COLA for 2019. However, we have all felt the price increases at the grocery store and in energy prices. Please be respectful and honoring of the job your pastor is offering and offer as much of an annual salary increase as is possible. In addition, the National Conference adopted the statement that "Churches that are financially able are encouraged to give either a larger percentage increase or to consider an additional increase as a merit raise in salary for each pastor. This merit raise would be in addition to the approved percentage salary increase."

Theme... ALL IN; Session Two, Article One

He died for everyone so that those who receive his new life
will no longer live for themselves.
Instead, they will live for Christ, who died and was raised for them.
2 Corinthians 5:15 (NLT)

YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE captures the content of the first two articles I recently offered, each the approximate text of the teaching I provided at National Conference this past May 2018. The bottom line is that we embrace—OWN—who we are. Identity integrity is of vital concern as we anticipate Kingdom ministry. There can be little hope to “fit and flourish” in a ministry context if we do not know ourselves, strengths and weaknesses.

ALL IN, in addition to a personal element, has a church wide element. We are being redeemed. The following Scriptures begin to capture this ideal.

- 2 Corinthians 5:15 (NLT)... He died for everyone so that those who receive his new life will no longer live for themselves. Instead, they will live for Christ, who died and was raised for them.
- Ephesians 2:19b-22 (NIV)...[You are fellow citizens with God’s people and members of God’s household,] built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. ²¹ In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. ²² And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.
- Ephesians 4:11-13 (NIV) ... It was he who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, ¹² to prepare God’s people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up ¹³ until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.

God is using community to complete Christ’s Body. Community and ministry draw us together around Jesus, from whom we learn what to do and how to do what we do. And as he does with each one of us, God works to redeem our community.

On certain Sundays, looking across our sanctuary, I recognize a face for which I have no name. “We have a visitor!” My heart races: Who is he/she? I used to be guilty of thinking “one more for the head count, one body closer to becoming the size we’re looking for.” But no more! Not most days! Hardly ever, now. Now I wonder: What are their skills and abilities, gifts and graces? What do they come equipped to do? Or are capable of learning to do? I wonder what they will help us become or accomplish that we cannot be or do without them.

Now, I fully get that the Cross was all about me, my sin, my death, my new life, and my part in the Kingdom. But also, at the same time, the Cross was/is the same for each one of us. And when we do the math, it takes all of us “in Christ” to fill out the Body of Christ and to complete his

mission on earth.

It’s at this point that I can get stuck. I’ve been around long enough to know that “I” can get the way of “we.” And if I am not honestly in touch with myself—you know the line: YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE—I as a leader cannot take my team or congregation where I am not already headed myself.

And yet as pastor or leader, that is our task, to help our team members or congregation identify their gifts and graces, develop their gifts and graces, identify their cross-over skills and abilities, encourage the use of their skills and abilities, and then deploy them into grace-based ministry.

There is a shift in our thinking that must take place. As we’re mastering YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE, we need to help our team members or congregations join us on the adventure. Each individual needs to define him/her self and the group needs to own who “WE” are or are becoming. In the end, our new mantra should become WE ARE WHO WE ARE.

WE ARE WHO WE ARE is all about our corporate identity, who we are when we come together and when we serve together. This is not as simple as running each individual through some kind of “get-to-know-me” assessment tool or experience. That is part of the process; but we must also consider how we all fit together, how we all work together, and how we add to one another and the team.

This awareness stretches IDENTITY from simply being about me, myself and I, to being about and including every person on the team. Or big picture, it is about everyone who names the name of Christ for life. This at the very close, local level, is me and my church. This at a much larger, global level, is me and every other Christ follower.

Pastor and delegate, you did not attend National Conference simply for yourself. You came to represent a much larger body of people united under the name of your congregation. Actually, you represented an even larger body of people that transcends time and place, Kingdom people.

Now, in the same way you and I are being redeemed, remade in the image of Christ, the worldwide Church is in process of being redeemed, the individuals and the corporate Body. We have been saved/redeemed, and we are being saved/redeemed.

When we come together as a faith community, it is a redemptive matter. The individuals are becoming more Christ like, the individuals are completing/becoming the Body of Christ, which is becoming more of what Christ made possible by way of Manger, Cross, and Empty Tomb.

Regardless what we were told when we trusted Christ as Savior, we are always redeemed into the Body, never redeemed merely for ourselves. Yes, when we ask Jesus to save us, he does indeed save us. But NOT so we can be a lone wolf, an all-by-myself Christian. That is not a real thing/a real person. We are always saved for and united

into the Body of Christ. “I” becomes part of “we.” And this “we” is the community of God is using to complete Christ’s Body. This idea captures “go and make disciples” and “love one another” and “love others.”

A key aspect of healthy and effective participation in and with the community of faith, Christ’s Body is identity. We must know who we are, not just as individuals, but also as community. We must identify—assess and measure, discern, label, and name it. AND own who we are as individuals and as community.

All of it... I am short or tall. I am skinny or overweight. I am weak or strong. I am saved. I am gifted. I am skilled. We are a small or large community. We are a confused community. We are an inward-focused community. We are a stubborn community. We are a going and making disciples community. Or not! We must own these things as they apply to us.

We must own who we are! Or lie and pretend/live in denial. To lie or pretend or deny assures a certain sad ending. To own our identity is a step toward health.

Now, how does one go about identifying “who I am?” or “who we are?” My friends, we’ll need help: a coach, mentor, guide, a tool or tools. Few of us can do this well on our own.

- Gifts and Graces ... A good goal is to be able to say, “I recognize my gifts and graces,” as well as plan to unpack these spiritual enablements so they are available for church and Kingdom. This is making the most of spiritual empowerment. This is what we discussed in our first session.
- Skills and Abilities ... A good goal is to be able to say, “I know what I can do,” as well as plan to continue to deepen my well of skills and abilities for church and Kingdom. This is offering my/our personal best! And each of us adds to the others in the Body.

So, where do we start? Start with the pastor. Start with the delegate(s). Start with the leadership team(s). Then add in the congregation.

Pastor, you will need to initiate this process. Invite your delegate(s) to join you on the adventure of getting to know your congregation. Start small—Show Me Health. God deeper—GRIP or GRIP and Birkman. Reach into your church family—NCD study and coach. Do something.

You may already know more than you think you know. (Or maybe not.) The process of looking inward is not just healthy, it is also a step toward health, strength and fruitfulness.

In the next article, we will survey the tools and the process of getting to know your church family, your corporate ministry team. Some tools are free, others “not so much.” And the E.C. Leadership Team has professionals and practitioners available to walk with you.

A KEC Thought:

Missional Conversation Starters

Les Cool

Some of the chatter today in church circles revolves around the idea of being “missional.” We want to see God’s will done, to see Heaven on earth. We want to see Christ exalted, to see more and more people come to know Jesus as Savior and Lord. Missional lifestyles—seeking to fulfill God’s redemptive plan—are what we bring to the table.

But how do we start?

If mission is about going, we ought to consider where we go and what that means for our lives “on mission.” If mission is about connecting and sharing, we ought to also consider with whom we might connect while “on mission.” Perhaps the following questions (best processed with others on the same journey) might be helpful. Maybe you’ll discover other questions that better fit your lives and ministry context.

Let’s think about the “where” of “on mission.”

- Where do I regularly go (maybe each day or each week)?
- What are the stops along my usual daily journey?
- Where do I spend the most amount of time around people?
- Where do I see the same people again and again?
- Which places along my journey allow for conversations?
- Which places have been tagged “no God allowed” zones?
- Are there places that overlap my interests and passions (hobbies, etc.)?
- Are there places that attract people like me? Or unlike me?

Let’s think about the “who” of “on mission.”

- What kind of people do I pass by each day?
- Who are the people at my usual daily stops?
- Who do I know “by name” at each of my usual stops?
- Who do I know about the people I usually see each day?
- What conversations have I had with people I see each day?
- Do I pray for these people?
- When (if at all) have I felt compelled to talk about Jesus?
- With whom would I say that I have a relationship?
- What might this relationship mean for being “on mission”?

Please do not make this complicated. These questions are designed to get us thinking about missional living along our usually daily journeys. We’re not looking to close the deal. We’re thinking about who we might connect with and what those connections might be or mean as we continue to see these people. So, with whom will you discuss these questions? And when?

God Space: Where Spiritual Conversations Happen Naturally

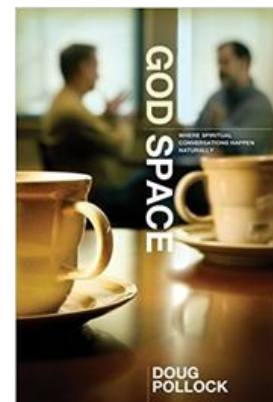

The number one reason people cannot—as they explain it to me—“share or talk about Jesus” is they can’t figure out how to make the conversation happen. Relax! You don’t have to make the conversation happen. Let God do that! All you need to be an alert (that means listening) friend. So, all of that hanging out with your neighbor has not been wasted. You have a friend. That is good.

But don’t panic that the conversation hasn’t happened yet. This happens a lot. To you. To me. To that other guy. And not because you didn’t want to, not because you don’t want to.

Pollock shares stories and insights that help us recognize the moment, providing examples from real life accounts of God conversations that don’t end with an awkward silence. In fact, it is possible the moments have come and gone. Again, relax! They come along again. Honest!

Read the book! Read the book with friends. Add some prayer. That’s the formula for making the most of lessons learned.





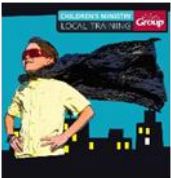
